## Family Support at ESPS

Edmonton Suzuki Piano School (ESPS) structures its programming based upon the philosophy of Dr. Shinichi Suzuki. Dr. Suzuki's approach to learning requires a strong parental commitment and involvement in the educational process – parents are a key cornerstone of the Suzuki triangle.

This year, ESPS made a strong commitment to begin the process of better supporting families in their efforts to learn and practice with their children. We began the school year by providing our members with family tote bags. The bags came with a practice binder designed to encourage successful note-taking and practices. Parents also received a practice die with ideas for games and activities to try during practices and a copy of *First Class Tips for Suzuki Parents*, a book chock full of ideas to promote success in practicing.

For new families, we began to redevelop our Parent Class to make it easier to attend and take home practical and usable information. We also began to offer the classes more frequently and included the fee for attendance within the annual registration fee. Our next class is on Saturday, April 25<sup>th</sup> at Suzuki Charter School. # Register for the SPRING FESTIVAL

Our Edmonton Suzuki Piano annual Spring Festival is coming soon. Saturday, April 18 is the date and parents should already have received registration forms. They need to be filled out and returned to your teacher by March 28th.

Our Suzuki festival is both a performance and educational opportunity. It is non-competitive, meaning that the adjudicating teacher will evaluate and comment on the students performances but will not give out any grades or placing (1<sup>st</sup> or 2<sup>nd</sup> etc.) The students are placed in classes of three to five students according to what piece they are playing, what book they are in, and their age. Each student prepares a piece and polishes it to their highest level of excellence as possible and performs it in the class for the visiting teacher to evaluate and make written comments. These comments typically include suggestions for further study, practice tips, and encouragement.

The festival is a wonderful opportunity to hear other students perform as well. Without a doubt, students and parents learn much and are inspired and encouraged by hearing the performances and adjudications of the other students in their class. Also, teachers strongly encourage and urge students and parents to take in at least one additional class at the festival, if not the whole day!

This year, we are most fortunate to have two adjudicators that some of us are already quite well-acquainted with. Ms. Anne Haywood was a teacher with ESPS for many years before retiring and moving to New Westminster, BC. She will be coming back to Edmonton for our festival. It will be a real treat for us all to enjoy her company and expertise again. Mr. Joseph Fridman is a renowned teacher and performer who now lives in Edmonton and teaches at the Alberta Music Academy. We were inspired by him at our festival two years ago, and we enthusiastically anticipate having him adjudicate again this year.
